Beginner:

- A pizza wouldn't be a pie without its signature circle shape. Let's dig into a little <u>circle math</u> just in time for Pi Day.
- A pizza slice might be one of the most famous triangles of all! Can you list all six different types of triangles?
- It's easy to count 1 pizza pie, but how do you count a slice? This <u>intro to fractions</u> will show you how.

Intermediate:

- Did you know? <u>Roman numerals</u> were the most common method for writing numbers in Europe up until the middle ages.
- If you're going to run your own pizza shop, it's a good idea to <u>practice exchanging money</u>.
- Pizzeria owners have to buy supplies in large quantities. <u>Practice counting by 2s, 5s,</u> 10s, and 100s.

Advanced:

- How well do you know your shapes? Use your knowledge to <u>identify these different</u> <u>types of triangles</u>.
- In this <u>hands-on fraction activity</u> you'll cut out partial pizza pies and order them from least to greatest.
- How many pizza slices should you eat? <u>Solve this question about equivalent fractions</u> to get the answer.





Science & Geography

Beginner:

- Gooey cheese makes pizza great! At this dairy farm, you'll watch the fascinating process of <u>making cheese from scratch</u>.
- The key to great pizza is the dough. Learn why <u>making fresh pizza dough</u> is mostly a waiting game.
- Did you know? Sauces and dressings use an amazing principle called <u>emulsification</u> to become smooth and delicious.

Intermediate:

- See the beautiful <u>Bay of Naples from space</u> in this incredible satellite footage from the European Space Agency.
- Pizza making is a tasty science! Follow along in a <u>Neapolitan pizza kitchen</u> and learn the science behind each step.
- Majestic Niagara Falls is just a hop and a skip from Buffalo, NY, the birthplace of hot wings!

Advanced:

- Go behind the scenes at a <u>Parmigiano-Reggiano factory</u> to learn more about the science of crafting this famous cheese.
- Did you know that Naples, Italy is right next door to Mt. Vesuvius? Learn how this <u>historic volcanic explosion</u> unfolded to destroy the nearby city of Pompeii.
- Pizza ovens are pretty special! An experienced baker explains <u>how these super</u> <u>hot brick ovens work</u> to make perfect pies.





Languages & Literature

Beginner:

- <u>Little Nino's Pizzeria</u> by Karen Barbour. A boy discovers the meaning of family as he helps in his parents' pizza shop.
- <u>Pizza</u> by Frank Asch. With a little support from his parents, Baby Bear musters up some courage to try a new food: pizza!
- <u>Lorenzo the Pizza Loving Lobster</u> by Claire Lorden. After Lorenzo falls in love with a new food called pizza, he has a little trouble recreating it under the sea.

Intermediate:

- <u>A Picnic in October</u> by Eve Bunting. A young Italian American girl learns why her family's annual trip to The Statue of Liberty means so much to her grandma.
- <u>All the Way to America</u> by Dan Yaccarino. This sweet story follows four generations of a family newly arrived in America.
- If you want to pronounce Italian correctly it's best to start with the alphabet, or as the Italians call it, *il alfabeto*.

Advanced:

- What Was Ellis Island? (Chapter 1)? By Patricia Brennan Demuth. This nonfiction book is packed with amazing facts about the history of immigration to America.
- <u>Peppe the Lamplighter</u> by Elisa Bartone. Young Peppe finds a job to help his immigrant family make ends meet in Little Italy.
- Are you ready to make some new friends? These <u>basic greetings</u> will help you break the (Italian) ice.

Writing Prompts:

• Imagine you're an immigrant living in a New York City tenement building in 1895. Write a letter home to your relatives in Italy telling them at least 3 interesting things about your new life in America.





History & Culture

Beginner:

- Did you know? More than 4 million Italians passed through <u>Ellis Island</u> between the 1880s and the 1920s on their way to America.

Intermediate:

- America has its fair share of pizza styles too! This handy guide will walk you through the <u>major types of pizza</u> you'll find stateside.

- Buono Appetito! Meet your meal in a new language with these delicious <u>beginner</u> <u>Italian food words</u>.
- Dig deep into the <u>history of pizza</u> with PBS and explore how this three-ingredient wonder came to be one of the world's most popular foods.
