






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Math

Beginner:


- Can you count the different types of Diwali lamps?

Intermediate:

- Imagine you're traveling around the world, including a stop to India. Let's practice <u>converting</u> money to different currencies so you can bring home lots of souvenirs.
- If 1 rupee equals 100 paise, can you complete these <u>conversions</u>, followed by your shopping bill?
